NSPCC Number Day The World of Maths

For number day at St Stephens we either dressed up in professions which used numbers or maths or with numbers on our clothes to celebrate numbers and maths all around us.

What this looked like in Year 6!

The football group informed us that as part of improving their game, footballers and their coaches look at a range of data and statistics in order to form a game plan. Also they discussed the angles used to ensure that their shot on goal was accurate, along with the numbers on their shirts

represents their positions. We also had a dice costume which promoted a discussion on the properties of a cube and we found out on our History of Maths Timeline, that it is thought that the first dice was used in 6000 BC. A couple of us came as Game coders and this linked to our famous Mathematician: Alan Turing who was influential in cracking the German Enigma Code during the Second World

War. We all agreed that when at school, maths also features in the other subjects e.g. computing, geography, history, art, Spanish Some of us chose are favourite numbers and were able to list its proper-

ties e.g. a prime number, a square number, the first even number which was not a prime number, the square root of 81, the 3rd multiple of 6, the product of 6 and 5.

We also learned about the development of the number systems throughout history and represented our number in the Hindu ~ Arabic System, the Babylonian System, in the Mayan System and in Roman Numerals. After using our maths skills to crack the Fibonacci sequence we used our knowledge of the properties of circles to draw circles with radius that followed the sequence.



This was the first time that we had

used a compass and we certainly had to draw on our resilience to succeed~ the smiles at the end of the session showed that we had.

We then created some artwork using the circles from the Fibonacci sequence. Wow~ what a lot we have learnt about the world of numbers- they are everywhere!

Marine conservation and seed bomb making in Year 5 and Year 6

Today we were very lucky to have a visitor from Plymouth Marine Aquarium. Esther shared a large number of marine artefacts with us; which we were able to handle and investigate. She told us about her job and the importance of sea grass to ecosystems and combating the ever rising levels of Co2 in our atmosphere. While on the subject of sea grasses and seed dispersal, we moved on to talk about wild flowers and their important place in our local land environment. We went outside to make our own seed-bombs, which we all took home and will disperse in responsible places where we would like to see wild flowers flourish once more. It was an amazing experience - Thank you Esther.

Some of our Year 5 and 6 children represented St Stephens in an Andaras Cross Country competition at St Catherine's, along with three other Trust schools. It was great to see so many children taking part and enjoying sport.

Wild Tribe First Aid in Y4 and Y6

Wild Tribe First Aid is an outdoor learning programme developed to incorporate the governments' inclusion of the following objectives in the updated Physical Health and Mental Wellbeing curriculum for primary children:



Pupils Should Know ...

How to make a clear and efficient call to emergency services if necessary. Concepts of basic first aid, for example dealing with common injuries, including head injuries.

The key points that the children learnt were: What is first aid Recognising dangers and hazards Which emergency service to call. Conducting a primary survey on a casualty Placing a casualty in the recovery position Understanding what is in a first aid kit How and when to call the emergency services Common injuries and how to deal with them
