Kathy Walsh (Staff Governor)

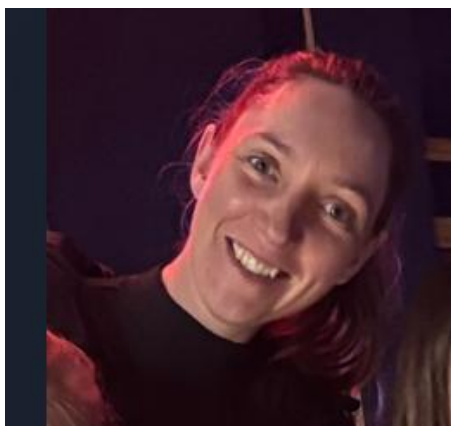
