School Improvement @Team St Stephens

On the last Monday before half term we were delighted to welcome our CEO; Will Herman and our two Trust Improvement Officers; Neil Swait and Deborah Saunders to undertake an Ofsted Audit visit. They spoke with myself and the staff, many of the pupils and our Chair of Governors; Joan Heaton. They looked around our wonderful school, visited lessons, went out into the playground and enjoyed sharing some very positive findings with us and obviously gave clear direction for our next steps. Some comments on our report include:



- Leaders set high expectations for pupils' behaviour and conduct. Relationships amongst pupils and staff reflect the school's positive learning culture.
- Pupils behave very well in lessons. They focus intently on their learning, demonstrating positive attitudes to their education. No low-level disruption was observed in any lessons visited.
- Pupils move around the school site in a calm and orderly way. They are polite and well-mannered.
- Leaders are clear about pupil expectation, aspiration and rights the schools learning environment successfully reflects these school beliefs.
- Leaders have created a school environment where pupils feel happy, safe and well looked after. Pupils say that they have a trusted adult that they can go to with a worry or a concern.
- Pupils talk confidently about the school values and how these are lived out in their day-to-day life. They readily identify key traits in a good friend such as loyalty, kindness, trust, honesty and mutual respect.
- Pupils are confident that the caring and nurturing environment ensures that all pupils, including those with
- disabilities, are looked after and made to feel valued. They would strongly recommend this school to a new pupil.
 Subject leaders speak knowledgably about their roles and responsibilities. They have undertaken a range of
- monitoring and evaluation activities to ensure that they have an accurate grasp of subject implementation. They are very well supported by senior leaders.

Jubilee Celebrations-A Special Visitor.

As part of our Platinum Jubilee celebrations, Year 3 and 4 were lucky enough to have a special visit from Lewis' parents, who shared his Dad's experience of working at one of the Queen's residences. Lewis' Dad was part of a team who completed renovation work on Windsor Castle after the building was tragically damaged by a fire in 1992. The fire started in Queen Victoria's Private Chapel, where a faulty spotlight ignited a curtain next to the altar. Within minutes the blaze was unstoppable and had spread to St George's Hall next door. The fire itself was first spotted around 11:30 on 20th November



1992. Three hours later, 225 firemen from seven counties were battling the flames. At the peak of the operation they were using 36 pumps, discharging 1½ million gallons of water. The fire was finally extinguished at 02:30 on Saturday, 21 November. It had burned for 15 hours. Next came the huge restoration task which was carried out by skilled workers. It took 5 years for the restoration works to be completed.

Lewis' Dad brought in a letter that he'd been given - which was signed by the Queen herself! We all felt incredibly lucky to



have seen and hold such a special letter from the Queen. The children had so many questions that they wanted to ask - everything from 'What colour did you paint the walls?' to 'Was there lots of security?'. Lewis' parents were very patient and happily answered all of our questions. After the visit, we went back into class to research Windsor Castle to help us imagine what it

must have been like to work in there. We also thought about what it must be like for the Queen and her family to live in such a lavish castle.

It was a fantastic experience for all of the children and we were very grateful to Lewis' parents for coming into school to share this unique experience with us.

His dedication, hard work and resilience has led to him achieving many awards including Welsh national record holder with a 2.25 meter jump, a Commonwealth Games finalist in 2002 and 2006 as well as



representing GB from 1998-2014. The children and staff loved being put through the circuit training session and this wonderful event was well supported by many families in the school community. We have now raised just under £200 for Wild Tribe resources.
