I am delighted to inform you that we have secured funding from the AnDaras Trust to complete the 'window project' at St Stephens. This will make such a difference in many ways. Firstly it will mean that each part of the school will have a brighter outlook– many of the old windows are so marked it appears that they are never clean! Secondly our hall windows will be on a system that will allow them to open and close fully to aid ventilation and also keep the heat in. This will also stop the water that leaks through into areas around the hall, being watertight in Cornwall is important! Lastly it will help to maintain the look and aesthetics of our school building– we want the school to be a comfortable and attractive place to learn and work in.

The works will commence in the Easter holidays and hopefully only take a couple of weeks to complete...depending on the weather. Please may I ask any children who use the school playing fields and playgrounds for football and the likes during the week-ends/holidays to be vigilant of any equipment and could you as parents/carers keep a

regular check on them. If the builders feel they are a distraction or at risk they will obviously be asked to leave the school premises. Thank you for your consideration in this matter and thank you to the Trust for enabling this to happen.

Religious Education

As part of our learning about Easter, on Tuesday 25th February, Year 1 made pancakes and explored Shrove Tuesday traditions around the United Kingdom. In groups, the children helped to make, fill and eat their pancakes! "We used milk, flour and eggs. Butter went in to cook the pancakes. Mrs. Coole cooked the pancakes and she flipped them over to cook

the other side." Rather skilfully, all the pancakes remained in the pan and the children assured me that no pancakes ended up on the floor or on the ceiling!

Some comments from the children:

"I tried lemon juice on mine for the first time and I love it!"

"It was my first ever pancake. It was delicious."

"I'd never tried pancakes before or lemon...the lemon was disgusting (!) but I loved the pancake!"

"I loved my pancake with jam on. It was so yummy!"

"For the first time I tried a pancake and I ate it all!"

The children also created their own stories about a runaway pancake. They displayed real imagination and independence in their story writing and should all be incredibly proud of their hard work.

Science –Investigating Weight and Mass

As part of our science topic of forces Year 5 have been examining the difference between mass (measured in Kg) and weight (measured in Newtons). We measured items with kitchen scales for the mass and force meters for the



weight. We then compared them and looked at

the relationship between the two.



Links in Year 3's Learning

We were learning how to write information texts using comparative and superlative vocabulary. We used our maths skills to measure out bones from 'The Book of Bones' by Gabrielle Balkan, in the playground and practiced comparing sizes.
