Week Ending 31st January 2020		Last week our Academy Improvement Officer and practicing Lead Ofsted Inspector, Neil Swaite, visited us to explore the quality of reading provision and to assess how well the school is teaching phonics and

I am delighted to share the summary of strengths he identified:</li> <li>The teaching of phonics and early reading is effective.</li> <li>Leaders place the upmost importance on ensuring that all pupils, including the weakest 20%, become proficient readers.</li> <li>The school's phonics programme is suitably ambitious. Leaders have set out the precise number of letters and sounds that pupils need to learn term by term.</li> <li>Pupils demonstrate a good level of accuracy when applying their knowledge of letters and sounds in their reading.</li> <li>Children start learning their letters and sounds from day one in the Reception class.</li> <li>Pupils working behind the pace of the school's phonics programme are catching up quickly.</li> <li>Teachers and teaching assistants have received well targeted training in early reading and phonics. Consequently, they are suitably skilled and demonstrate a good level of expertise.</li> <li>Pupils talk enthusiastically about books. They display a love of reading.</li> <li>Pupils concentrate well in their phonics sessions. They are exceptionally well behaved.</li> </ul>
