This week we were delighted to host a Trust Governors network meeting. It is so good to share ideas, discuss strategies that support the Trust schools to provide the very best they can for the children .Together we identified areas that need a particular focus.

Survival Skills and our Climate Curriculum



Last week Class 3 had their first of three days at the Woodland Skills Centre. Our learning in these sessions is based on survival skills.

One of the activities that we took part in was a 'taste test'. We learned about different foods that could be foraged on Dartmoor.

Most of class 3 tried whortleberries, which were sweet and very similar to blueberries. Seven daring children volunteered to taste a cricket! One child said they tasted salty and like meat, another said they were disgusting!



On our return to school, Class 3 were asked what they learned. Here are some of their responses:

We learned that humans need food, water, shelter and warmth to survive.

We learned how to signal to a rescue helper that we need help.

We learned about how a compass works and how we can use this for navigation.

We learned how to make nettle syrup using water, baby nettle leaves and sugar.

Outside Learning –Life skills in Action



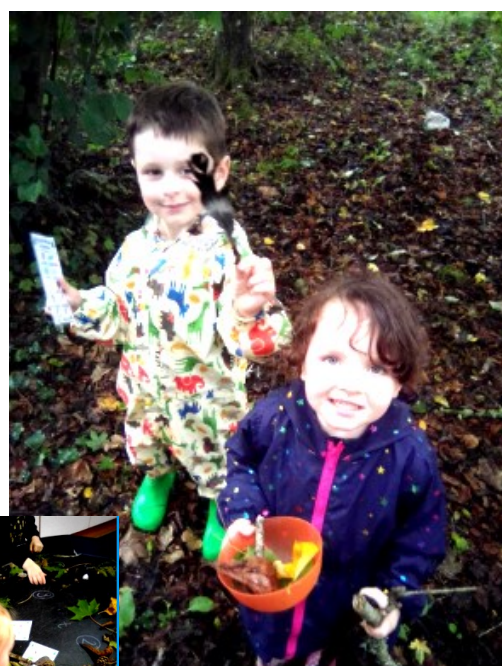
September went by so fast, I think it's because we've been having so much fun in Preschool!

Reading for Pleasure Weekly Assemblies

Last week, with KS2, Ms Neale shared the text 'The Promise' written by Nicola Davies and illustrated by Laura Carlin.

'On a mean street in a mean city, a thief tries to snatch an old woman's bag. But she finds she can't have it without promising something in return – to "plant them all". When it turns out the bag is full of acorns, the young thief

embarks on a journey that changes her own life and the lives of others for generations to come. Inspired by the belief that a relationship with nature is essential to every human being, and that now, more than ever, we need to renew that relationship, *The Promise* is the story of a magical discovery.' Ms Neale chose this book because it links with the schools' learning about the environment and climate change, with strong links to our climate curriculum.

Mrs Lumby chose to read the book 'The Squirrels Who Squabbled' by Rachel Bright and Jim Field in this week's KS1 assembly.

This is a laugh-out-loud tale about friendship and learning to share, as two squirrels squabble over one nut but ultimately put their differences aside and co-operate.

Mrs Lumby chose this book because it is all about sharing and friendship. It is also full of fantastic vocabulary, such as: squabbling, towering, squealed, gathered, convinced, sprinted, hollered and scurried.
